How Much Funding Will Your State Lose?

Below is a state-by-state breakdown of the reduction in funding that would be realized if the Even Start program is reduced to \$100 million, as currently proposed by House-Senate conferees. This analysis was prepared by the Congressional Research Service (CRS) of the Library of Congress and takes into account “set asides” for target populations, small state minimums, and other requirements of the law. The Senate will return to Washington on Dec. 17.
